Graham Beeson, 1 of our members from Whangaparaoa, has been building historical model warships since age 16 including models of warships which served in the Royal NZ Navy and naval ships which had a connection with the Royal Navy.

HMS Neptune was seconded by the Navy and was steaming to NZ when she sailed from Alexandria on 19 December 1941 into a German minefield off Tripoli, North Africa.


Out of a total crew of 764, 150 New Zealanders were on board. Able Seaman Norman Walton was the sole British survivor. The tragic story of Neptune's loss inspired Graham to honour the memory of her Crew by building a replica model. The model is to 1/96th scale, i.e. 96 times smaller than the actual ship is 5'9" long and weighs about 12 pounds. It's constructed with a fiberglass hull, wooden decks, Superstructure of wood and is covered in metal plate and various other materials. The fittings are made of metal. Included in the detailing of the model of Neptune, there are 150 crew painted figures representing all the New Zealanders who died. There was also a Royal marine Band on board; the Royal Marines will be represented by a contingent of Royal Marines with fixed bayonets paraded on the quarter deck of the model warship.

Graham and his wife have been invited to a new public Neptune Memorial unveiling in Dunedin on Friday 12th December 2008. The model of Neptune will be displayed in the main hall at HMNZS Toroa along with displays from the Otago Museum and the NZ Navy Museum.

It's worth mentioning that Graham has built a "fleet" of 16 :-

Museum Standard static warships 7, Radio Control Warships 4, Other Warships 5.

Graham's future projects include models of H.M.S. New Zealand Battle Cruiser 1918, H.M.S Chatham Light Cruiser 1929, H.M.S Dunedin Light Cruiser 1935, H.M.N.Z.S Leander 1942 and H.M.N.Z.S Achilles 1946.

Royal Navy in firefight with Somali pirates.....

The parents of young new Royal Marines are being told to buy body armour for their children because it is better than standard issue kit, an MP has claimed. Desmond Swayne, the Conservative MP for New Forest West in Hampshire, said senior officers in charge of training at Lympstone in Devon had been passing on the advice as the marines prepared for active service in Afghanistan. He made the claim in the House of Commons during a debate on defence training.

He questioned Defence Secretary John Hutton, alleging he had been told the information by the family of a recruit. He demanded to know why the Osprey standard-issue body armour for troops on active duty in war zones was not the best available. "At a recent open day at Lympstone, the parents of young men who are shortly to emerge as fully fledged Royal Marines were advised by a senior officer to purchase a piece of equipment – body armour – of a better, more suitable specification than what is currently issued," he told the House. "If senior officers consider equipment important enough for parents to buy it for their sons, should not quartermasters be in a position to issue it? In answering that question, will the Secretary of State ensure that no aspersions are cast on the senior officer involved?"

There has been much criticism in recent years over the quality and amount of equipment being supplied to British forces. Sergeant Steven Roberts died in 2003 in Iraq in a "friendly fire" incident. Before he died he had been ordered to give up his body armour because there were not enough sets to go around. Mr Hutton said that he would ask the MP for more information and look into the issue. "I hope that the honourable gentleman will give me more information about the circumstances that he has described," he said. "We have invested significant resources in improving the body armour available to our forces and I think that the Osprey body kit is pretty good stuff." [BBC News.](#)

Tears were shed as Royal Marines who fought in the Second World War's biggest amphibious operations wound up their veterans' association. Almost 100 old soldiers came to Portsmouth with their loved ones for the final reunion of the Landing Craft Gun and Flak Association (LCGFA). An emotional week-long programme of events was organized for members who are now all aged between 80 and 90. There was a poignant memorial service at the Garrison Church in Old Portsmouth. And the association handed over its roll of honour for safekeeping to the Royal Museum Museum in South-sea. The ambitious programme, which included a boat trip to Hamble and a visit to the Royal Armouries museum at Portsmouth – was made possible thanks to a 6,000 pound grant from the National Lottery. The LCGFA was formed in 1991 after a small group of veterans met at an open day at a commando base in Poole.

They decided to organize a formal get-together and for the past 14 years reunions have been held at the Royal Sailors' Home Club in Portsmouth. At it's peak, the Association boasted nearly 500 old soldiers from as far afield as New Zealand, Canada and the U.S. Vernon Copeland, it's secretary, said: "Our first reunion was packed out. You couldn't get anyone else into the club. It was like that for the first 3 years before numbers started dropping off. We've still got over 200 members but this is our final official reunion. As we're all over 80 now, organizing events becomes a bit of a gamble. There are always a few tears at times like this, but we'll also have a rollicking good sing-song." The roll of honour, which was presented to museum director Chris Newbery, lists the names of every member who has died since the association was formed. As advancing years take their toll on the survivors, their families will be able to contact the museum and get names added to the book. Mr Copeland, 81, said: "We did our gunnery training at Southsea and took part in the landings at Dieppe, North Africa, Sicily, Italy, Corsica, Normandy and Yugoslavia. My landing craft hit a mine off Elba in 1945. The stern was damaged and had to be towed to Taranto. We never lost anybody. Continued.....

The WWII Landing Craft consisted of Landing Craft Gun (Large) were armed with 2x 4.7in guns & up to 4 x 20mm quick-firing canons on a reinforced deck. They were manned by 47 sailors & marines. Landing Craft (Medium) had a crew of 31 operating 2 x 25-pounder or 2 x 17 pounders. The first Landing Craft Flak had twin 2in anti-aircraft guns plus several 20mm cannons, while other versions had 12 light AA guns. Each one had a 50-strong crew. 10 of all types were sunk in action during WWII, often with few survivors.

In addition to the Brigade deployment, Major General A Salmon OBE now commands the Multinational Division (South East) in Iraq. He is supported by most of the UKAMPHIBFOR Staff, who now form the core of his Headquarters. It is indeed a busy time for the Corps but those deployed will be sustained by the thought that they have the support of the whole Corps Family and many others from all walks of life behind them. The RMA is already gearing up for its next shoe box appeal as positive proof of this.

Away from operational matters, another successful Royal Marines Association Reunion Weekend has taken place at Lympstone with the Commandant General Royal Marines as the Guest of Honour. In what was expected to be a quiet year, the hall was packed to the rafters for the band concert on the Saturday evening and over 1500 people attended the drumhead service on the Sunday with over 500 marching on parade. Congratulations go to Marty Power from the Reading Branch for winning a close fought Standard Bearers' competition and with it, the honour of carrying the National Standard.
